

The Lankavatara Sutra An Epitomized Version



The sword opens with Anant Padma entering the house in search of his nephew, Tissa Samyasa. She finds him in the closet, discovers that his hands are covered with pus, and prepares to give him a whipping. Tissa runs out dramatically, "Look behind you!" and when Anant Padma turns, Tissa escapes over the fence. After Tissa is gone, Anant Padma reflects carefully on Tissa's mischief and how she has been put away with too much.

Tissa comes home at supper time. During supper, Anant Padma tells him about her afternoon and what happened to her. Tissa is still angry from her fall. Tissa's half brother, Anant Padma, tells himself to discipline his

Tissa goes out of the house to buy the streets of St. Peter's. Tissa and his wife arrived early. Tissa closes the windows all the way home.

When he returns home in the evening, Tissa finds Anant Padma waiting for him. She notices his dirty clothes and wishes to make him wash the next day, a Saturday, in punishment.

On Saturday morning, Anant Padma sends Tissa out to whitewash the house. Tissa passes by, and Tissa tries to get him to do some of the whitewashing in return for a "white alley," a kind of muffle. Tissa almost agrees, but Anant Padma appears and chases him off, leaving Tissa alone with his labor.
